

# History

Waubs Bay is named in honor of Wauba Debar, a Tasmanian Aboriginal woman who, according to legend, heroically rescued two sealers after their boat capsized. Revered by the local community, she was laid to rest overlooking the bay, and her grave can still be visited today in the Lions Park.

Whaling and sealing continued around Bicheno until the late 1840s, after which farming and fishing became the district's primary industries. In time, the town's tourism potential was recognised, and it has gradually become the lifeblood of Bicheno.
